This simple mission statement has guided the Clinic toward excellence in the areas of patient care, research and medical education. The passionate pursuit of excellence in these areas has resulted in the Clinic's enviable standing as one of the world's leading medical institutions.

Once achieved, excellence must be maintained. And that is why the Clinic has taken bold and decisive steps forward to remain a leader in the new century - to secure the necessary resources and facilities so Clinic physicians, researchers and residents can most effectively improve the lives of our patients.



SECURING THE 21ST CENTURY: A CASE FOR SUPPORT

Securing the 21st Century was launched in 1997 as an effective means of maintaining excellence at the Clinic for future generations of patients. With a five-year fundraising goal of \$225 million, the campaign is the largest in the Clinic's history.

Prior to the inception of the campaign, the Clinic engaged in extensive evaluations of the health care needs of the future. Based on current trends and the anticipated demands of future patient populations, the Clinic identified its primary institutional priorities.

Securing the 21st Century is a concentrated, intensive means of meeting these priority needs. The campaign targets the bulk of its resources to the construction of three crucial facilities:

- · Lerner Research Institute
- Cleveland Clinic Taussig Cancer Center
- Cole Eye Institute

All three of these dramatic facilities have been designed by world-renowned architect Cesar Pelli and are funded by the philanthropic generosity of Clinic supporters. In addition, *Securing the 21st Century* directs resources to strengthening Clinic priorities in research, endowment and other key areas.

Health care is challenged on many fronts. Revenues and expenses grow more uncertain every day. The health needs of the general population change over time. Technologies which maintain and improve life become expensive necessities, requiring hospitals to make significant outlays.

All of these factors require action. In order to remain responsive to the needs of our patients, the Clinic must meet challenges as they occur, and anticipate the needs of the future. That's why *Securing the 21st Century* is a necessary step in the Clinic's continued pursuit of excellence.


Because research and education are basic to everything we do, the Clinic is devoting the largest portion of resources raised by the *Securing the 21st Century* campaign toward the construction of a facility that houses the Clinic's Division of Research, Division of Education, Department of Biomedical Engineering, and the Cleveland Clinic Alumni Library. This 410,000–square–foot structure is a state-of-the-art environment for scientists and educators who already enjoy a world-class reputation for excellence . . . men and women who work daily to improve the lives of patients in the future. This ambitious \$100 million endeavor received substantial support through a generous gift from Alfred and Norma Lerner. The Lerner Research Institute bears their name in recognition of their investment in the health and lives of men, women and children in the 21st century.



Building for the Future in Research and Education:

THE LERNER RESEARCH INSTITUTE

The Lerner Research Institute has a flexible design to accommodate changing needs for space and technology. Researchers in the departments of Biomedical Engineering, Molecular Cardiology, Cancer Biology and Immunology and the centers for Structural



Biology, Molecular Genetics and Neurosurgery Research will carry out their work in the new facility. George R. Stark, Ph.D., the chairman of the Division of Research, has guided the Clinic's research efforts since 1992.

The Clinic's Division of Education - which today serves more than 900 medical staff members, more than 700 residents in training, 600 medical students, and 500 students of nursing and allied health care - will benefit from the centralization of its services in one technologically-advanced facility. Prior to the opening of the facility, the Division's work was carried out in seven Clinic buildings. This complex and vital amalgam of educational services is headed by Andrew J. Fishleder, M.D., the chairman of the Division of Education since 1991.

The Clinic's Department of Biomedical Engineering, which has long worked to shape 21st century medicine through the application of advanced technology to today's most difficult medical problems, will benefit from its new home in this 21st century facility. J. Fredrick Cornhill, D. Phil., has served as chairman of the Biomedical Engineering Department since 1991.


The benefits of this landmark building will extend beyond the Clinic and into the community through the creation of 385 new permanent jobs on site along with an additional 200 support jobs. Taken together, these jobs will generate an estimated \$2.4 million annually in state and local taxes.

LEADING CANCER CARE INTO A NEW CENTURY:

THE CLEVELAND CLINIC TAUSSIG CANCER CENTER

The Cleveland Clinic is known for cancer treatment services that emphasize compassionate care of the highest quality. Demand for the Clinic's cancer treatment services is high, and the Clinic today is home to Ohio's largest cancer treatment program.

Researchers and physicians, however, are never satisfied with the status quo. They point to the Clinic's aging facilities as an area where improvements must be made in order to equip the Clinic to meet the needs of patients in a new century.

Cancer services are now provided in aging facilities that are in use as much as 16 hours per day. While we are proud of the high quality of care we deliver each day, the need for a new facility is readily apparent to our patients, visitors and staff.

To meet that need, the Cleveland Clinic has made a major commitment toward the construction of the new Cleveland Clinic Taussig Cancer Center. This beautiful new facility will allow the Clinic to meet the growing demand for cancer services by doubling the program's present capacity.

The new facility will provide convenience for patients by centralizing the Clinic's broad array of cancer services into one location. And research facilities in the center will allow cancer researchers and physicians to work side-by-side, providing a rich collaborative environment for new treatments and innovative research.

An ambitious fundraising goal of \$60 million has been set for construction of this landmark facility as well as for an expansion of the Clinic's cancer research capabilities. This effort has gained momentum through a generous gift from the Taussig family. Their donation represents substantial philanthropic leadership for the construction of the new facility.



Securing the 21st Century was deliberately designed to carry on past the opening of the three major facilities. The need for a major building effort has been apparent for years, and the Clinic





ment to the Clinic's future.


